How to Get Started

Step 1: Choose a Category

Start by selecting a healthcare career category that matches your interests and skills, such as billing, coding, healthcare IT, or telehealth services. Choosing the right path early helps you focus your training and career development.

Step 2: Research Certification

Many healthcare careers require professional certifications from organizations like American Academy of Professional Coders or American Health Information Management Association. These certifications validate your knowledge and significantly improve your chances of getting hired.



Step 3: Build a LinkedIn Profile

Create a professional profile on LinkedIn that highlights your skills, education, and certifications. This platform helps you connect with recruiters, healthcare professionals, and companies offering remote job opportunities.

1. Medical Biller

What They Do

Education or Certification Required
